

Most Serious Issues Facing the Industry in Next Five Years Unprompted, All Stakeholders, % Total Mentions, 2017





# Engaging with the Federal Government: the Current Legislative and Regulatory Landscape



The Women's Mining Coalition was founded in 1993 to fend off attempts to enact industry-crippling changes to the Mining Law. Thirty-one years later, we are continuing to fight that fight.

- Narrow partisan margins in Congress + election-year politics make enacting legislation difficult this leads to an increase in administrative processes such as Executive Orders & agency rulemakings
- Mixed Messages: Congress has earmarked billions for critical minerals while administrative processes are utilized to limit mining
- Widespread acknowledgement of the need for minerals and risks of reliance on foreign adversaries has not translated to an acceptance of domestic mining
- Recognition that permitting delays affect everything related to multiple use of public lands not just mining

# Federal Legislative and Regulatory Hardrock Mining and Federal Lands Issues

#### Senate bills:

- The Mining Regulatory Clarity Act (S. 1281) aka "The Rosemont Fix"
  - Restores and clarifies rights under the U.S. Mining Law that the 9<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court of Appeals' ruling in the Rosemont litigation misinterpreted
    - o (H.R. 2925) brought to the House floor just after Fly-In and passed the House on 5/8
    - Referred to Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources (ENR) on 5/9
- The Mining Schools Act of 2023 (S. 912)
  - Creates new funding for US mining schools to recruit students and pursue research
- The Good Samaritan Remediation of Abandoned Hardrock Mines Act (S. 2781)
  - Creates a pilot liability relief program for Good Samaritans who want to cleanup an abandoned hardrock mine

#### House bills:

- The Mining Regulatory Clarity Act (H.R. 2925) same as S. 1281
- The Western Economic Security Today Act of 2024 (H.R. 3397)
  - Requires BLM to withdraw Conservation and Landscape Health Rule
    - Passed out of the House on 4/30
    - Referred to Senate ENR on 5/1
- The Mining Schools Act of 2023 (H.R. 2685) same as S. 912




# Federal Legislative and Regulatory Hardrock Mining and Federal Lands Issues Cont'd

### The U.S. Needs a Critical and Strategic Minerals agency

- Serve as federal experts on mining and minerals issues
- Focus on R&D for extraction, processing/reprocessing, and reclamation techniques
- Centralize and coordinate research from academia and the private sector for the good of the industry and nation

"The U.S. has lost its position as the global leader in mining, both in terms of total production and the development of cutting-edge mining technology...

The infrastructure necessary to restart the domestic mining industry has atrophied with the increased offshoring of mining."— IWG Report





# Election Year Politics: Administrative Tools to Achieve Policy Objectives

- The Bureau of Land Management's (BLMs) Finalized Conservation and Landscape Health Rule
- The BLM's Greater Sage-grouse Draft Resource Management Plan Amendment (RMPA) and Draft Environmental Impact Statement
- The Security and Exchange Commission's (SEC's) Natural Asset Class Rule and BLM's Natural Capital Accounting
- The Council on Environmental Quality's (CEQ's) Proposed NEPA Rule
- The Internal Revenue Service's (IRS') Draft Guidance excluding mining costs from the IRA's Advanced Manufacturing 10% Tax Credit
- The Interagency Working Group's (IWG's) Report
- Mine permit delays, denials, minerals leases revocation, and land withdrawals



## All of the Above Energy Strategy & Grid Reliability

#### Thermal Coal is Essential for Life

- Economical for Developed & Developing Countries
- Coal is abundant worldwide; the U.S. has ~25% of the world's coal reserves
- Provides energy security, affordability, and reliability
- Can ramp up when renewables are unavailable
- Reliable baseload power is needed to mine and process critical minerals/materials

#### Carbon Capture Utilization and Storage (CCUS):

- **Investment:** Cost of CCUS has significantly decreased with technological advancements, projecting costs to go down even further
- Positive Impacts: Potential option for gigaton Carbon Mitigation
- Positive Impacts: Provides Job Creation & Retention
- · Positive Impacts: Transition ready workforce
- Opportunities: Ongoing and increased research around development funding
- Opportunities: Extension of 45Q tax credit
- Opportunities: Closing the Cost Gap (45Q, direct pay, etc.)

"Delayed coal plant retirements are playing a key role in supporting grid reliability. However, this is only a temporary band aid because EPA regulations will cause more coal retirements that cannot be delayed. These regulations, especially the recently announced Carbon Rule, increase the chance of blackouts." – America's Power President & CEO Michelle Bloodworth

  - Targeted follow-up meetings with DOE

## A People-Centered Approach to Engagement

#### **Principles to Remember:**


- 1. It's never too early to engage
- 2. Pull up a chair at every table you can
- 3. Listen first ask your stakeholders what is important to them, then tailor your message and plans to that
- 4. Engagement is not just your External Affairs teams' job
- 5. Prioritize engaging with neutral and oppositional stakeholders
- 6. Allow space for joint-decision making
- 7. Partnerships should be mutually beneficial
- 8. Get comfortable being uncomfortable

## **Engaging with Tribal Nations**

- All land is tribal land
  - https://native-land.ca/
- Tribal Nations have faced historical exclusion and limited engagement in the U.S. in the context of mineral exploration and development
- Acknowledge and respect the sovereignty of Tribal Nations, the Government-to-Government Consultation process, and Tribes' rights to selfdetermination
- Understand that mining companies/project proponents cannot depend solely on government agencies for tribal engagement
- Understand capacity limitations faced by Tribal Nations and be prepared to provide adequate technical support
- Don't assume the needs of the nations speak to Councils, elders, staff, youth and make an effort to understand the community

There has never been a time of greater societal awareness of the importance of mined materials – mining has the opportunity to turn that awareness into action.

We all have a unique story to tell. We owe it to our industry and our communities to share those stories.
